2021-2022 Budget and School Board Election Edition

In April, the Lockport City School District Board of Education adopted an expenditure budget for the 2021-2022 school year in the amount of \$110,172,074. The details of the budget were presented to residents during the public budget hearing on Wednesday, May 5, 2021. The Budget Vote and Board of Education Election date is Tuesday, May 18, 2021. Highlights of the 2021-2022 budget include:

- The continuation of current programs and personnel to support students in meeting or exceeding New York State graduation requirements. The most recent graduation rate for Lockport High School is 91%.
- A 1.688% increase to the tax levy, which is the maximum allowable tax levy limit increase for our district. Since the inception of this law, the Lockport City School District Board of Education has always stayed within or below the calculated tax levy limit.
- The maintenance of positions and programs to keep the district in compliance with NYS Education Department mandates and services for a diverse population of students.

The **Budget Notice for the 2021-2022 proposed budget** is included on the next page of this newsletter. Information relating to further reductions, if necessary, for a **contingent budget** is included in the budget notice.

As our school district continues to navigate through challenging fiscal times resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, we continue to carefully review expenditures and revenues in order to improve student achievement and sustain our shared mission of preparing Lockport students to be college and career ready. Please turn to pages 6 and 7 of this newsletter to get a glimpse of what is happening in our schools.

The 2021-2022 school budget is, again, one that preserves quality and comprehensive educational programs for students, and is mindful of the financial challenges faced by community members. Thank you for your past support of capital improvement projects and budgets. All eligible citizens are encouraged to vote on Tuesday, May 18, 2021.

PROPOSITION NO. 2

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT, 2021

Shall the following bond resolution of the Board of Education of the City School District of the City of Lockport be approved, to-wit:

A BOND RESOLUTION, DATED MARCH 24, 2021, OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT OF THE CITY OF LOCKPORT, NIAGARA COUNTY, NEW YORK (THE "DISTRICT"), AUTHORIZING THE DISTRICT (1) TO UNDERTAKE (SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL OF THE VOTERS OF THE DISTRICT) A CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT CONSISTING OF THE RECONSTRUCTION AND RENOVATION, IN PART, AND THE CONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS AND UPGRADES TO, VARIOUS DISTRICT BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES AND THE SITES THEREOF (COLLECTIVELY, THE "PROJECT"), AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$22,941,000; (2) TO EXPEND OR APPLY TOWARD THE PROJECT \$3,167,000 FROM THE DISTRICT'S CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS RESERVE FUND - 2014; AND (3) TO ISSUE SERIAL BONDS OF THE DISTRICT IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$19,774,000 TO FINANCE THE BALANCE OF THE COST OF THE PROJECT, AND DELEGATING THE POWER TO ISSUE BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE SALE OF SUCH BONDS TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE DISTRICT.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT, 2021 FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q. Why is the Lockport City School District proposing a capital improvement project?

The Board of Education is committed to providing a safe learning environment, properly maintained facilities and competitive athletic venues for our students and community. The District recently completed a Building Condition Survey and is updating the existing long range facility plan. Items of high importance were identified. In order to address these items, a Capital Improvement Project was developed. The project contains the following three components: Building Condition Survey items, academic environment improvements, and physical education program and athletic field enhancements.

Q. What work is necessary?

The work has been categorized into three components as mentioned above:

Building Condition Survey items

These items are similar to items found in our homes, which we repair or replace over time to keep our buildings in a safe condition. Upgrading mechanical equipment, replacing exterior insulated panels, upgrading an outdated elevator, and exterior facade repairs are included within this project component.

Academic environment improvements

These improvements include renovated art classrooms at North Park Junior High School and a computer lab at Lockport High School to enhance learning experiences.

Physical education program and athletic field enhancements
 Upgrades include a rubberized surface to the North Park Junior
 High School track and installing two turf softball fields adjacent to
 the recently completed turf baseball fields on Beattie Avenue.



Every five years, all school districts must have a registered Architect and Engineer perform an evaluation of the condition of their buildings and grounds. This is called a Building Condition Survey (BCS). This survey identifies areas where work is needed or mandated by current building codes. After studying and prioritizing these items, the Facilities Committee has recommended to the entire Board of Education a plan developed to address the work in phases thereby minimizing the impact on taxpayers. This project includes high priority items identified in the BCS in addition to completing the turf softball fields on Beattie Avenue as part of the original vision of the Board of Education.

Q. How will this Capital Improvement Project be funded?

The Capital Improvement Project will have no additional local tax impact. The District will be reimbursed approximately 89% of all eligible projects, and the local share of the cost is expected to be tax neutral due to the retirement of District debt following the 2022-2023 fiscal year as well as the use of District capital reserve funds.
